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




CD Review: JJ Grey & Mofro This River

JJ Grey grew up in North Florida and originally decided to be a surf bum. After trying that for a few years, he returned home to take a more prosaic job. While working, he formed the original version of Mofro in 1986. The personnel has changed over the years as the band moved up gradually from playing bars in the Jacksonville area, through recording for small labels, to a contract with Alligator in 2006. Constant touring has heightened the band's profile and *This River* is their fifth release for the label. They are probably Alligator's most popular current act. The music is not exactly blues, more like blues and roots-influenced rock, with a dose of the kind of swamp rock that was popularized by folks like Tony Joe White. Grey is a creative songwriter who has some original takes on life, a strong grainy voice that conveys emotion and a good but unflashy guitarist. The band is tight, honed by countless gigs. In addition to the leader on guitars and harp, there is a lead/lap steel guitarist, keyboard player, bassist and drummer, with a sax player and trumpeter on some tracks, for a varied sound.



The songs are tight and memorable. The emphasis is on them, not the virtuosity of the musicians. The album opens with a jolt, "Your Lady Is Shady," a putdown of someone who has taken up with a woman of less than stellar repute, while neglecting his wife, with just a hint of approval (autobiographical?). The somewhat frantic lifestyle that is conveyed by the album is continued with "Somebody Else," who is the alter ego of the protagonist who ends up in jail for life for killing (autobiography extended into fantasy?). Then he goes to "Tame a Wild One," where the subject can't "make a woman do right if she wanna do wrong." From there, it's the self-descriptive "99 Shades of Crazy," not to be confused with 50 Shades of Grey (sorry, couldn't resist). Most of the rest continue in the uptempo, somewhat frantic vein. The first exception is the second-to-last "Write a Letter," showing a devotion to the woman at home. From there, he goes to probably the weakest cut, "Harp & Drums," which is mostly a chant, "You know what I'm talking about...Lord it feels so good deep inside" (we get it, JJ). But it is the standout title closing track that completely changes the mood from hellraising. Primarily acoustic, slow and anguished, "Trying to see purpose, trying to see meaning, trying to make sense of the nonsense that I call my life...Only this river can bear me to safety...Only this river can bear me away...Guess I've been drinking away To keep the wolves of my mind at bay...Where did my soul go, Where did my spirit hide, Why didn't they rescue me from the pain in my mind." It ends a solid enjoyable release wanting you to hear more from an artist who has paid his dues.
















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


CD Review: Charles "Big Daddy" Stallings Call Me Big Daddy

As he announces on the opening "Intro' to his new CD (I like it when they) Call Me Big Daddy, it is the fourth recording by Baltimore Blues guitarist and singer, Charles "Big Daddy" Stallings. Like his last CD, this new release is presented as if it was a live club date, where on the intro track he introduces the others in his band and some special guests. Then there is a mix of old-school soul, funk and blues in the songs, before he closes the recording with an ending track that again thanks folks, with dubbed-in crowd applause.

The strength of Big Daddy's music is the warmth and humor of his vocals, as well as the strong, well-rehearsed band supporting him. With Joe Thomas on alto sax, LeRoy Flowers, Jr. and Michael Devilson on drums are the core on this recording. Steve Levine, his regular harmonica player, is on one selection; while another DC area harmonica player, Anthony "Swamp Dog" Clark, handles the bulk of the harmonica playing on this CD. Another important musician is Clarence Ward III, who plays mostly trumpet and flugelhorn, but adds booting tenor saxophone on some songs. Others can be heard as well, but space limits my enumeration of everyone.



The material on this recording is, however, mixed. Big Daddy Stallings has written all of the material, but for me there is too much fluff, such as the two-part "Boody Pop and Lock" as well as "Bunny Hop 2012" and "James #2." The latter number is the second tribute he has recorded to James Brown and is a nice piece of funky playing with a tough tenor sax from Clarence Ward III. Better is Big Daddy's duet with Nadine Rae, where he sings about if he had a million dollars he would give it to her — which then recounts him dreaming that he has given everything to her and she has left him broke and dusty. Also, he has the third in his series of down-home talking blues, "Hobbsville," with his affable recollections of growing up matched by a nice lazy Jimmy Reed groove (and nice "Swamp Dog" Clark harmonica). However, the third part of this installment ("Bonny Lee's") mutates into a borrowing of a Little Milton theme, as he sings "Bonny Lee's all right" to the Little Milton melody. Another nice track is the ballad "Don't Cry," which benefits from the warmth of Big Daddy's singing.

I cannot unreservedly recommend the CD as there is too much filler material here. Those familiar with the prior albums by Big Daddy Stallings will know what to expect and you can make your decision, in part based on those earlier recordings, or those fortunate enough to seeing Big Daddy live might likely pick up the CD there. Like Big Daddy's prior releases (and I recommend his first CD *One Night Lover*), this new CD is available on cdbaby.com and other better stores and websites.

Call Me Big Daddy was released by Tai Jeria Record Company. The reviewer, Ron Weinstock, was the Editor of the DC Blues Society newsletter for 20+ years, and now maintains a blog, In a Blue Mood, accessible at http://inabluemood.blogspot.com.

Review of "Wild Women Don't Have the Blues: A Tribute to Female Blues Artists"

On March 20, 2013, the Silver Spring Town Center hosted an evening of appreciation of women's contributions to the birth of the blues. Catherine Hogan, a blues lover and former Portland State University instructor, was joined by Ida Campbell, host of WPFW's "Don't Forget the Blues" show (Friday's at noon), to pay tribute to some blues pioneers who happened to be female.

Ms. Hogan chose to spotlight women who were born or came of age during the Classic Era of the blues, from about the turn of the century to about the 1930's. Before her presentation, Ida Campbell showed how the blues style arose from the call and response singing of the



enslaved people of the south. They sang songs, evocative of tribal African music, to distract from their suffering while they labored at arduous yet tedious work. For these oppressed people, singing was one of the only outlets for artistic and emotional expression. From this deep well of songs about death and anguish rose the blues, around 1900. The blues started in the Southern Delta, but spawned many different styles (e.g., Chicago and Texas), which Ms. Campbell ably described. In so doing, she provided context for the rest of the evening.


Ms. Hogan then gave an informative presentation about the lives of some pioneering blues women. She high-lighted that it was Mamie Smith (photo at left), not a man as is generally believed, who made the first commercially

available blues recording. These groundbreaking women had a lot in common. They were the daughters of the enslaved or sharecroppers. They weren't educated or sophisticated, but they were risk takers who left home early. Born into abject poverty, they had a strong will to not only survive but to thrive. They were courageous and inventive.

Mamie Smith and Gertrude "Ma" Rainey (photo at right) were born in the late 1800's. They incorporated their music into traveling minstrel shows and vaudeville acts. Mamie Smith, who sang both blues and jazz, was also an actress. She was first recorded in 1920, and her enormous success proved that there was a market for "race records." Ma Rainey

was a prolific songwriter and recorder from 1924-1928. She had enough clout to pick the musicians she wanted in her band. These early blues women were very inspirational to others that followed, like Bessie Smith, Ethel Waters, Ida Cox, and Memphis Minnie. Ms. Hogan concluded her presentation with a delightful clip of Sister Rosetta Tharp, singing and playing the guitar. She also underscored that the Washington D.C. area has many active female blues artists.

Ms. Hogan's intent was to honor blues women and to provide a sense of their lives and humanity. This she ably did with an engaging multimedia presentation that interspersed slides with archival footage and music recordings. Although the voluminous information Ms. Hogan had amassed could have been better edited and organized, she is clearly passionate about the music. She succeeded in diving the audience a sense of the enormous contributions women have
